Having a David (Godly) Heart

In <u>Acts 13:22</u>, When Paul was preaching in the Jewish synagogue at Antioch of Pisidia, he referenced a statement made by Samuel to King Saul back in <u>1Sam.13:14</u>. There Samuel informs Saul that God would take the kingdom from him and give it to "a man after His (God's) own heart…" The man to which God, Samuel, and Paul referred was David, the son of Jesse.

We unfortunately remember people for their specific *short-comings* rather than more completely for their *over-comings*. Accordingly, we might be prone to associate David with his failures regarding Bathsheba, or the bloody nature of his military exploits and kingdom. Surely neither of these was overlooked by God, and in fact, the latter sprang from the former, <u>2Sam.12:10</u>. But, if this is the only view we have of David, we are indeed missing what God saw in Him, <u>cf. Acts 13:22!</u>

How could a man guilty of adultery and murder, and who was prevented from building a house for God because of all the *blood on his hands* (<u>cf. 2Sam.7:2-13; 1Chron.22:8; 28:2-3</u>), be called "a man after God's own heart"? The answer can be found, in part at least, in David's response to God's refusal, <u>2Sam.7:18-29</u>. What a prayer of thanksgiving, honor, and reverence for God in the face of what could have been disappointment and shame! But not so with David! He shows us his heart.

But there are other clear indicators of the "heart" of David- just read the <u>Psalms!</u> Let's examine just a few of these to get a closer look at David's heart, that we might come to know, and perhaps grow, a *godly* heart of our own.

I. David's heart was in the right place of understanding and action (mentally), 1:1-6

- >It walked in the right place, v.1a
- >It stood in the right place, v.1b
- >It sat in the right place, v.1c
- >It delighted in the right place, v.2a
- >It meditated in the right place (and at the right times!), v.2b
- >It stayed firm in the right place and bore the right fruit at the right time, v.3.

II. David's heart was in the right place of refuge (security), 16:1-6

- >It had the right refuge (place of shelter/protection), v.1
- >It had the right Lord (Master, Controller), v.2a
- >It had the right self-image, v.2b
- >It had the right company, v.3
- >It had the right worship because it has the right God, v.4
- >It had the right support, v.5
- >Therefore, it had the right *inheritance*, v.6

III. David's heart was in the right place of emotion/affection (emotionally), 18:1-3

- >It had the right power supply, v.1
- >It had the right foundation, v.2a
- >It had the right security and deliverer, v.2b
- >It had the right protection and weapon, v.2c
- >It had the right Savior, v.3

IV. David's heart was in the right place regarding sin (generally & conceptually), 19:12-14

- >It was in the right place regarding self-deception, v.12
- >It was in the right place regarding motivation, v.13
- >It was in the right place regarding desire, v.14

V. And David's heart was in the right place regarding <u>his</u> sin (*specifically* & *individually*), 51:1-19

- >It had the right sense of accountability, vv.1-4
- >It had the right attitude of repentance, vv.5-9
- >It had the right desire/motivation for restoration, vv.10-13
- >It had the right spirit of sacrifice and praise, vv.14-17
- >It had the right long-term overall goal, vv.18-19

VI. Conclusion

While certainly no one should desire the *sins* of David, oh, if we could have our *hearts* in the same places as his:

- -in the right place of understanding and action;
- -in the right place of refuge;
- -in the right place of emotion and affection;
- -in the right place regarding sin in general; and
- -in the right place regarding our own sins specifically!
