Building for the Lord, 1Corinthians 3:10-15

<u>Psalm 127:1</u>, "Unless the Lord builds the house, they labor in vain who build it…" Last Wednesday evening, I included and read our subject passage (<u>1Cor.3:10-15</u>) along with the text we were considering, but ran out of time before really using and applying it to our study of *The Wise and Foolish Builders* from <u>Matt.7:24ff</u>. So, I thought we'd go back there this evening for a more complete understanding of its contribution to the subject of building for the Lord.

The Context of 1Cor.3:10-15

Before we can really comprehend (and subsequently correctly *apply*) any passage or text, we must first understand it in its context. Thus far in Paul's first epistle to the Corinthians, several salient points have been made- each predicated and built upon the previous:

- There were *divisions* (fractures in fellowship) that manifested themselves in split allegiances to *men* rather than a unified devotion to Christ, <u>1:10-17</u>.
- These stemmed from affections for and affiliations with worldly wisdom/words over divine wisdom/words, 1:18-20.
- To correct these things, Paul further endeavors to remind them of: the *true nature* and *power* of God's wisdom, <u>1:21-31</u>; his own previous practices and purpose when among them, <u>2:1-5</u>; and the *process* (of inspiration) by which God's wisdom is expressed and was delivered to them, <u>2:6-16</u>.
- Then he reveals that their *fleshly* attitudes and activities had hindered the normal and natural process of *growth* and *development*, 3:1-9.

It is within this context that we find our text.

The Primary Points of 1Cor.3:10-15

- A. Regardless of who *begins* or *continues* the work, each must be careful *how* he builds, v.10. The right *foundation* is essential (cf. Eph.2:20), but so too is: the right *purpose/objective*, cf. 1:17; 2:2-5; the right *binding agent* (the *wisdom/words of men* divide and destroy, while the *wisdom/words of God* unify and save), cf. 1:13,21-24; and the right *means/method* of building, 2:1-5!
- **B. Building must always be upon the** *right foundation* **of Jesus Christ,** <u>v.11</u>. If we seek to *build* on the foundation of "man's felt needs" (of health, wealth, or entertainment, <u>cf. 2Tim.4:3-4</u>), we surely have the wrong foundation- and the structure will be destroyed, <u>cf. Matt.7:24-27!</u>
- C. The durability of each man's work is dependent upon the quality of the materials utilized, vv.12-13. Paul had built in Corinth upon the correct foundation, cf. 2:1-5, and Apollos had added to the structure, cf. 3:4-6, but whether or not the building remained would be dependent upon the quality of the Corinthians themselves- for they were building blocks of the structure! Would they be gold, silver, and precious stones, or wood, hay, and straw, v.12? At the time of writing, and acknowledging that the final verdict of testing with fire was yet to be determined, they were certainly looking more like wood, hay, and straw (very flammable) as

opposed to *gold*, *silver*, and *precious stones* (which are either *purified by* or *impervious to* fire)!

- **D. Reward versus saved though suffering loss, vv.14-15.** These verses are difficult unless we keep them in, and carefully note, their context. To that end, consider a few pertinent specifics:
- The reward spoken of is predicated up the work/building remaining, v.14, but such is not the only factor. Note that it will also be "according to his own labor," v.8. What do these things mean? If the Corinthians failed to remain would Paul (or Apollos) be denied the reward of heaven? Certainly not, for Paul has already pointed out that he had built upon the right foundation, toward the right purpose, with the right binding agent, and in the right way! The Corinthians themselves would determine whether or not they were inflammable or flammable building blocks when tested by fire, cf. v.12.
- Given these things, the reward mentioned is not heaven itself, but the satisfied pleasure of a builder who sees his work remain though tested by fire, cf. 2Cor.7:11; 1Thess.2:19!
- Conversely, should his work not remain- be burned up (destroyed rather than purified/hardened by fire), he shall suffer the loss of heartache and despair of what might have been, rather the joyful reward of victory and triumph, cf. 1Thess.3:5. Therefore, he himself shall be saved on the basis of his own proper labor, even though what he attempted to build was destroyed when tested, cf. vv.8,15.

Take-Home Lessons for the Corinthians and Us:

- 1. The building is God's, so *no man* can destroy it without recompense, <u>vv.16-17</u>. Some, if not most or even all, of the Corinthians were *destroying* God's building there in Corinth through their improper affection/affiliation with worldly wisdom, divisive attitudes and activities, and spiritual immaturity. These particular verses (<u>vv.16-17</u>) are a very specific warning to them, and all others similarly afflicted, against being *destructive* rather than *constructive*.
- 2. Let no man deceive himself, vv.18-20. If any man thinks he is wise in (and of) this age- and thus presumes himself to be gold, silver, or precious stones, but is in reality wood, hay, and straw to be burned, is therefore, very much deceived. He thinks he is mature, but is yet a babe. He thinks himself wise, but is yet foolish. He thinks himself worthy of reward, but will be destroyed.
- 3. Christians are *inheritors* of all things, <u>if</u> we are (or become) building blocks of *gold*, *silver*, and *precious stones*, in God's *building*, <u>vv.9,12,21-23</u>. No man- including Paul or Apollos, can do that for you. <u>You</u> determine what *kind of building block* you are! So, will be *gold* or *silver building blocks* that are *purified* and *improved* rather than *destroyed* by fire? Will you be *building blocks of precious stones* that are impervious to *fire*? Or will you be *building blocks* of wood (strong, but vulnerable to fire) or *hay/straw* that cannot withstand *testing by fire*? The choice is yours!
