## Why We Believe What We Believe (Subjective vs. Objective Motivations)

We "believe" something for one of two reasons:

- 1. A clear and undistorted view of evidence forces us to a conclusion (belief) regardless of our feelings and desires = **objective**.
- 2. Our feelings and desires cause us to either ignore the evidence or at least "see" it in a distorted way to arrive at the conclusion (belief) we desire = **subjective**.

Obviously, the first pathway to "belief" is *objective*, while the latter one is very much *subjective*. Jesus highlights the problem of *subjective* belief (and its results) in Matt.13:13-15. But within these two primary pathways to "belief" there are at least seven separate, though often related, motivations. The *subjective* pathway has six, while the *objective* has but one. Let's consider them for a few moments.

## Subjective Motivations for Belief:

- It's Easy- Intellectual Laziness. This is all I want to believe- it's good enough for me; minimum intellectual commitment is the priority, <u>Jas.2:19</u> (<u>cf. Deut.6:4</u>); <u>cp. Mark 12:29-31</u>. This is often the bastion of the "spiritual, but not religious" who "know" two passages: <u>John 3:16</u> and <u>Matt.7:1</u> (but do not really understand or believe either of them!).
- 2. **It Suits Me / Fits My Lifestyle-** *Moral Relativism*. It allows me to live the way I want; moral liberty is the priority, <u>cf. Matt.19:16-22; cp.1Cor.6:9-20</u>. If what I "believe" does not change me and make me better, then I have become my own "God," <u>Phil.3:19</u>.
- 3. **It's What I Think-** *Intellectual Arrogance*. I am the smartest person I know; it making sense to me is the priority, <u>Acts 17:16-20, 22-31,32</u>. Unless our "beliefs" lead us to convicted obedience, they are worthless, cp. Jas.1:26.
- **4.** It's What My Family Believes / Taught Me- *Emotional Connections*. I could never go against my families' beliefs; family loyalty is the priority, Matt.10:34-39.
- **5.** It's What Our Church Teaches- *Traditional Loyalty*. This is what "your church" teaches? What does God/Christ/Holy Spirit teach, <u>cf. Matt.15:1-13</u>? (By the way, "His" church will teach the same thing, cp. Matt.23:1-12; Luke 6:46.)

These all boil down to...

**6.** It's What I Want to Believe- Subjectivism. Whether the source of this motivation is personal, national, familial, or traditional really does not matter, for they are all subjective in nature- what <u>I</u> want. But this is the question that must be honestly asked and answered: "Is what <u>I</u> want to believe more important than what God says?" Phil.3:3-6,7-11; cp. Acts 26:9-20. On the other hand, there is but one...

## **Objective Motivation for Belief:**

1. **It's the Truth.** It's what the evidence dictates and God demands; knowing and being obedient to truth is the priority. <u>John 8:31-59</u>.

Why do you believe what you believe? How did you come to "believe" it? Subjective motivations, or the Objective evidence and desire to please God above all else?
