"Why Has Your Countenance Fallen"?

Primary Text: Genesis 4:1-24

Preliminary Points:

- From <u>v.1</u>, after expulsion from Eden and with it the provision and pleasure of fellowship with God, perhaps Eve's words are an expression of having experienced the full-force of the second consequence of her sin, cp.3:16;
- Adam and Eve's first two sons chose very different "career paths," v.2;
- At first glance, it appears that Cain's "offering to the Lord" was logical, being simply a sacrifice of what he produced and had- "of the fruit of the ground," v.3;
- And that Abel had done likewise, v.4a;
- Which makes the Lord seem at least overly critical, if not harshly and unfairly judgmental, in His acceptance of Abel and his offering, and the subsequent disregard and rejection of Cain's sacrifice, vv.4b-5a;
- But please consider some additional *light* on the subject from a couple of N.T. passages...
 - ➤ Heb.11:4 states that Abel's sacrifice was "By faith"...
 - Rom.10:17 makes it clear that the only way this could be true was (and is) that God had previously instructed them regarding proper sacrifices;
 - Thus, **Abel** *faithfully obeyed* God's instructions, while **Cain** *faithlessly disobeyed* (whatever his motivation may have been).
- From v.5b, note that Cain had two reactions to God's rejection of his offering:
 - ➤ He became *very* (exceedingly) *angry* (vexed/irritated); and,
 - ➤ His countenance (visage/face) fell (to collapse; from erect to prostrate).

<u>Primary Points of Consideration</u> (at least for this lesson):

- 1. Just because it's what we want to give doesn't mean that it's "worship," or what God wants/expects, v.5a; cf. Rom.10:17; 14:23; 10:17;
- 2. Like Cain, we often *get angry* and let our *countenance fall* when told we're wrong- especially when we realize the truthfulness of the charge, <u>v.5b</u>; <u>cp</u> Jonah 3:10 4:9;
- 3. When we're angry and unhappy, it's usually because we're not living by faithand though such is not always the case, we usually know it, v.6; cf. Ps.4;
- 4. When we've failed to live (or worship) by faith, we need to just go back and do the right thing, v.7a; cf. Acts 3:19-21;
- 5. The key to happiness is *pleasing God*, not *pleasing self*, v.7b; cf. Eph.5:7-15;
- 6. If we refuse and fail to *master sin,* it will make us its *servant,* <u>v.7b;</u> <u>cf.</u> Rom.6:15-23;

- 7. Misplaced (unrighteous) anger winds up hurting both the guilty and the innocent, v.8; cf. Gal.5:13-15;
- 8. "Yes," we are our *brother's keepers*, <u>v.9</u>; <u>cf. Heb.12:14-17</u>;
- 9. We *may* hide our sin from others, but we can *never* hide it from God, <u>v.10</u>; <u>cf.</u> Ps.139:1-11;
- 10. Sin *always* has consequences that are both *spiritual* and *physical*, <u>vv.11-12</u>; Gen.2:17; Ezk.18:20; Gal.6:7-8;
- 11. We may not take our sin seriously until its consequences are brought to bear and it's too late, v.13; Heb.12:15-16.
- 12. Though we can be forgiven the *spiritual consequence* of our sin (there is no evidence of Cain's repentance or forgiveness), the *physical consequences* may follow us for the rest of our lives, <u>vv.14-15</u>; <u>1Cor.15:9</u>; <u>1Tim.1:15-16</u>; and,
- 13. When we refuse to *repent* (and go back and do the right thing, <u>v.7</u>), a lasting legacy of sin and consequence can be passed on to subsequent generations, vv.16-24; Luke 11:45-54.

Concluding Points:

I used to think the book of <u>Genesis</u> was about "our" *origins-* and it certainly is that;

But it is also about "my" present, and "my" future... with or without God.

The same is true for you. Will you be a *faithful* "Abel"- pleasing God regardless of the cost and creating a lasting legacy that "still speaks" of spiritual fidelity, <u>Heb.11:4</u>? Or, will you be a *faithless* "Cain"- do that which pleases you and helping to lead future generations to lives of sin, anger, violence, and condemnation, 1John 3:12; Jude 11?
