Christ's Healing of the Leper, Matt.7:28 – 8:4

(Mk.1:40-45; Lk.5:12-16)

(Kenny Chumbly's great article, "The Gospel in Miracle" {The Prairie Papers, #181} provided some of the information in this lesson, and much of its inspiration.)

Introductory Observations:

- This story, in many ways, well-illustrates the Sermon on the Mount, <u>Mt.4:23</u>. Jesus' compassion (<u>Mk.1:41</u>) for the afflicted in all forms (<u>cp. Mk.6:34</u>) was on full display.
- Though "great multitudes followed Him" (v.1), He was moved to action by one man who was "full of leprosy," Lk.5:12 (cp.Lev.13:1-59).
- Leprosy, because of its defiling capabilities and the fact that it was incurable by man, is easily comparable to sin. If Jesus' power over paralysis demonstrates His divinity (cf. Matt.9:2-6), how much more so the isolating and loathsome disease of leprosy, cf. Lev.13:45-46!
- Jesus' warning to "tell no one" is explained in Mk.1:43 and Lk.5:14-16. His admonition to "go, show yourself to the priest, and present the offering" was exactly what the Law required (cf. Lev.14:1-32) that he might be certified as "clean," re-enter the camp, and rejoin his family and life itself, 5:17-18.

Primary Lessons:

1. The Leper's Faith, v.2.

Manifested great reverence: he *bowed down* (*proskuneo*- worship; *falling* on his *knees*, Mk.1:40; and *face*, Lk.5:12); addressed Jesus as *Lord* (*kurios*), acknowledging Jesus' *position* and His *divinity*.

Furthermore, "if you are willing" does not doubt His power, but is only concerned with whether or not such a one as Jesus has the sympathy, compassion, and concern for a wretch like me! Can I, even I, so steeped in defilement, be cleansed?

"You can make me clean." You have to power and ability to return me whole to my family, to society, to life itself (cf. Lev.13:46)... if only you are willing to manifest compassion!

2. "He touched him."

We cannot possibly imagine the *power, compassion,* and *life-altering impact* of this single act of *touching* the defiled. Given the contagiousness of the disease, this man had perhaps spent years without knowing the simple pleasure of human contact.

Jesus' power to heal did not *require* physical contact, <u>cf. vv.5-13</u>, but He realized not only what the man *wanted*, but also what he *needed!* He was willing to become *defiled* Himself to provide *cleansing power*, cf. Lev.5:3.

3. "I am willing; be cleansed."

Can there be any *sweeter* and *hope-filled* and *realized* words for one who has lost so much, and suffered so greatly, <u>cf. John 6:37</u>? For one so defiled, and so mired in hopelessness, surely there can be no sweeter words!

The *immediacy* of cleansing manifests Jesus' power, and that of His words, cf. 11:5; Rom.15:18-19; 1Cor.2:4-5.

Lessons for Us:

- 1. It does not matter how defiled (or separated from the camp) you are-Jesus can heal and make you whole, Titus 2:14!
- 2. But you are going to have to *come, bow down,* and call Him *Lord* to be *cleansed,* Rom.10:8-10.
- 3. He will touch you, and change your life completely, 2Cor.5:17!
- 4. He did and does so by taking on our defilement, 2Cor.5:17-21.
