## The Good News of the Gospel

I'm sure many preachers have said it in one way or another. I remember my friend and colleague Shane Carrington saying it this way, "Remember that the gospel is supposed to be *good news*." Sometimes we forget that. We emphasize the tremendous price paid to bring it into fruition, the notable difficulties of living according to its demands, and/or the minutia of its details until it no longer seems to be *good news*. Perhaps in these ways our *minds* are "led astray from the simplicity and purity of devotion to Christ," 2Cor.11:3. There is an inherent simple purity in the good news of the gospel message, and this same beautiful simple purity is also found in devotion to it. Let's look together and see the good news of the gospel for ourselves...

## The Good News of the Gospel of Jesus Christ from 1Cor.15:1-5:

- 1. "Christ died for our sins according to the Scriptures," v.3b. In order for the eternal Son of God to die, He first had to be born and live as a man- He become one of us; one of His own creation, cf. Heb.2:14-15. As a human, death was inevitable, Heb.9:27. But His death had a singular purpose: it was "for our sins." You see, the penalty for sin is death, Rom.6:23. It has been so from the beginning, Gen.2:17. But an imperfect sacrifice cannot atone for or redeem from sin and its penalty. Thus, to "die for our sins," Jesus necessarily could have none of His own- and He didn't, 1Pet.2:21-23. Therefore, He could and did bear "our sins in His body on the cross, that we might die and sin and live to righteousness; for by His wounds you (we) were healed," 1Pet.2:24. Jesus didn't die on the cross for our sins because "the world wasn't ready for Him" as some affirm; it was the "predetermined plan" and by the "foreknowledge of God" for Him to be "nailed to a cross by godless men and put Him to death," Acts 2:23. It was, as our text of 1Cor.5:3 says, "according to the Scriptures."
- 2. "and He was buried," v.4a. As another preacher friend of mine once said while we studied the first few verses of Rom.6 regarding the "burial" of baptism, "You don't bury live folks, you bury dead folks." The man, Jesus Christ, was dead, as confirmed by the Roman centurion both at the cross and to Pilot, cf. John 19:33-34; Mark 15:44-45. He did not merely swoon as some claim, He died and was, as we examined last week, taken down from the cross, wrapped in a linen sheet, and buried by Joseph of Arimathea, Mark 15:46. But...
- 3. "He was raised on the third day according to the Scriptures," v.4b. Jesus revealed this plainly to His disciples late in His ministry, Matt.16:21; but had alluded to it almost from its beginning, John 2:18-22. The resurrection was THE prominent proof of Jesus being the Messiah in early apostolic preaching, cf. Acts 2:24,32; 3:15,26; 4:10; 5:30; 10:40; 13:30,33,34,37; et al; because of Rom.1:4 and 1Cor.15:12ff.
- **4.** "He appeared to Cephas, then to the twelve," vv.5ff. The significance of His appearances is that it proves the resurrection; He appeared to those who knew and recognized Him, cf. John 16:20,22; 20:19-20,24-29; those who had seen Him crucified and killed. His resurrection proved who He was; His appearances to those who knew Him best proved His resurrection.

This gospel of Jesus Christ is good news to: (Acts 8:12)

- 1. Those lost in sin- which is everyone, Rom.3:9,23ff.
- 2. Those *lost in life-* including some who don't even realize they're lost and haven't yet asked for directions, John 14:6.
- 3. Those searching for meaning and purpose in life, 1Pet.3:8-12; 4:6.
- 4. We don't have to set our affections, fulfillment, and hope in things here and now, 1Cor.15:19; Col.3:1-11.

The simple conclusion: The gospel of Jesus Christ IS "good news" for everyone who will hear and obey it! Will you?
